## "JESUS APPOINTED TWELVE" (4) John 1:43-51

## Introduction:

- 1. Several years ago I was staying in the home of a Christian in Fort Worth.
  - a. Our conversation turned to evangelism.
  - b. He asked: "Whatever happened to those Jule Miller filmstrips? I used to be be out several nights a week showing them."
- 2. Churches of Christ were the fastest growing religious body in the US from 1945-1965.
  - a. Congregations had week long Gospel Meetings.
  - b. Soul winning by every member of the church was taught.
- 3. Today, it is different:
  - a. Many members will not even support a three day meeting.
  - b. Very few Christians will try to teach others one on one.
  - c. The church is not even keeping up with population growth!
- 4. The church grew rapidly in the first century because:
  - a. They taught daily publicly and privately (Acts 5:42).
  - b. Every member was a teacher (Acts 8:4).
- 5. Jesus chose soul winners to be His apostles.

Discussion:

- I. "JESUS FOUND PHILIP."
  - A. John, the immerser, pointed the first two disciples to Jesus, but "Jesus found Philip and said 'Follow Me.'"

- B. What do we know about Philip?
  - 1. The apostle Philip's name is found in the four lists of the apostles (Matthew 10; Mark 3; Luke 6; Acts 1).
  - 2. Only John gives us additional information about him.
  - 3. His name is Greek and means "a lover of horses."
  - 4. The name was made popular by Philip of Macedon, the father of Alexander the Great.
  - 5. There was also a prominent evangelist in the early church named Philip.
    - a. He was one of the seven servants (Acts 6:1-7).
    - b. He preached in Samaria (Acts 8:5-25).
    - c. He taught the Ethiopian eunuch (Acts 8:26-40).
    - d. He lived in Caesarea (Acts 8:40; 21:8,9).
  - 6. Philip was from Bethsaida, the home of Peter and Andrew (John 1:44; 12:21).
    - a. Bethsaida was condemned by the Lord because they rejected Him (Matthew 11:21,22).
    - b. In spite of this, three apostles were raised in this wicked place.
    - c. One can do right and be good even if raised in a bad environment!
- II. "PHILIP FOUND NATHANAEL."
  - A. Philip wanted to share the Good News with his friend.
    - 1. He told Nathaniel: "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law, and also the prophets, wrote -Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph!"
    - 2. Nathaniel was not impressed: "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth?" he asked.
    - 3. Nazareth was a despised city in Galilee (Jno. 7:52).

- 4. Philip did not argue, but said "Come and see;" he was willing to let the evidence speak for itself.
- B. Philip often brought people to Andrew who brought them to Jesus.
  - 1. It was Philip who was asked by Jesus: "Where shall we buy bread that these may eat?" (John 6:5,6).
  - 2. It was Philip to whom the Greeks came asking to see Jesus (John 12:20-22).
  - 3. It was Philip who said to Jesus: "Show us the Father, and it is sufficient for us" (John 14:8,9).
- C. History records that Philip, Nathanael, and Philip's sister, Mariamne, traveled together teaching the Gospel.
  - 1. In Hierapolis of Syria, Philip and Mariamne were arrested and imprisoned.
  - 2. Philip was scourged and he and Mariamne were hanged on a pillar for opposing idolatry.

## III. NATHANAEL FOUND JESUS.

- A. Philip had invited Nathanael to "come and see" Jesus.
  - 1. When Jesus saw Nathaniel, He said: "Behold, an Israelite indeed in whom is no guile."
    - a. The Savior knew what is in men (John 2:24,25).
    - b. He saw in Nathanael a true Israelite who served God and trusted in His promises (cf. Rom. 9:6).
    - c. There was no guile (deceit, hypocrisy) in him.
    - d. He was an honest, open, sincere man "What you see is what you get."
  - 2. Nathanael asked: "How do you know me?"

- a. Jesus replied: "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you."
- b. Jesus showed His omniscience for He knew Nathanael was in his secret place of prayer.
- c. Nathaniel understood the implication: Jesus must be the Christ, the King of Israel."
- 3. Jesus promised: "You will see greater things than this!"
- B. This apostle had two names: Nathanael and Bartholomew.
  - 1. In the four lists of the apostles, his name appears as Bartholomew.
  - 2. Only John calls him Nathanael (John 1:45-51; 21:2).
    - a. Nathanael's name means "God has given."
    - b. Bartholomew means "son of Tolmai" (similar to "John's son" or "Johnson" in English today).
    - c. The apostle's full name was "Nathanael, son of Tolmai" or Nathanael Bartholomew.
- C. We know very little else about Nathanael Bartholomew.
  - 1. He was from Cana in Galilee (John 21:2).
  - 2. After the resurrection he was one of five apostles and two other disciples who met Jesus at the Sea of Galilee (John 21:1-14).
  - 3. History tells us that Nathaniel preached in India, Parthia and Armenia where he was martyred.

## Conclusion:

- 1. There are an estimated five million members of the churches of Christ in the world today.
- 2. If each member would teach just one other person each year, in just 12 years, every one in the world would hear the true Gospel.
