THE SEVEN SAYINGS OF JESUS FROM THE CROSS (Matthew 27:32-44)

Introduction:

- 1. The Lord's last sermon was preached as He died on the cross.
- 2. His pulpit was the cross, an instrument of torture and death.
- 3. His hearers were a mixed multitude.
 - a. Angry Jewish leaders who continued to mock Him.
 - b. Hardened Roman soldiers who callously carried out His crucifixion.
 - c. Two thieves on crosses on either side of Him.
 - d. Despairing disciples who saw their hopes dashed by His death.
 - e. Weeping women who loyally stood by to the end.
 - f. His grieving mother and John, His beloved disciple.
 - g. Shallow spectators who had come for the show.
- 4. The Lord's sermon consisted of seven sayings.
- 5. There was one convert then but thousands later (Luke 23:42, 43).
- 6. The dying words of great men are deemed worthy of remembrance how much more so the dying words of the Savior!

Discussion:

- I. "FATHER, FORGIVE THEM FOR THEY DO NOT KNOW WHAT THEY DO" (Luke 23:34).
 - A. Jesus' first thoughts were for His enemies.
 - 1. He had taught, "Love your enemies, bless those who curse you, do good to those who hate you, and pray for those who spitefully use you and persecute you" (Matt. 5:44).
 - 2. Many die cursing their enemies but our Lord died as He had lived with love in his heart for all men.
 - B. Was Jesus' prayer answered? If so, when?
 - 1. Some believe God forgave them even as they continued in their cruelty.
 - 2. If this is the case, then those who committed the most unspeakable atrocity were forgiven without repentance.

- 3. Repentance has always been a condition of forgiveness.
- 4. Jesus' prayer was answered on Pentecost (Acts 2:23,36-41).
- II. "TODAY, YOU WILL BE WITH ME IN PARADISE" (Luke 23:43).
 - A. The two thieves joined in with the mob who mocked Jesus.
 - 1. One had a change of heart and rebuked his fellow thief.
 - 2. He admitted his guilt and Jesus' innocence (Luke 23:40,41).
 - B. The penitent thief implored Jesus: "Lord, remember Me when you come in your kingdom."
 - 1. He was aware of Jesus, His claims, and His teaching.
 - 2. Jesus answered: "Today, you will be with Me in Paradise."
 - 3. The thief was a Jew; therefore lived under the Law of Moses.
 - 4. He only needed to repent to be in a right relationship with God.
 - 5. Baptism as a requirement of salvation was not given until the Great Commission was given (Matt. 28:19, 20; Mark 16:15,16).
 - C. No one today can be saved as the thief was.
 - 1. The Law of Moses has been replaced (Col. 2:14; Heb. 7:12).
 - 2. Jesus is no longer on earth to pronounce sins forgiven.
 - 3. The terms of salvation under the New Covenant are different.
- III. "WOMAN, BEHOLD YOUR SON! ... SON, BEHOLD YOUR MOTHER" (John 19:25-27).
 - A. Mary, Jesus' mother, was standing near as was the beloved John.
 - 1. Although in the utmost agony, Jesus was mindful of Mary.
 - 2. He committed her to the care of His trusted disciple.
 - B. Why didn't Jesus' siblings take care of their mother (Matt. 13:55,56)?
 - 1. Apparently, Mary was a widow at this time.
 - 2. Jesus' brothers did not believe in Him until after His resurrection (John 7:5; 1 Cor. 15:7; Acts 1:14).
- IV. "MY GOD, MY GOD, WHY HAVE YOU FORSAKEN ME" (Matt. 27:46)?
 - A. Jesus lived in dread of the cross (Luke 12:50; Matt. 26:38,39; Luke 22:44).
 - 1. It was much greater than the dread of physical suffering.

- 2. It was the dread of separation from God!
- B. Jesus experienced the separation from God that unforgiven sinners will feel in eternity (1 Pet. 2:24; 2 Cor. 5:21).
- V. "I THIRST" (John 19:28, 29).
 - A. This is Jesus' only reference to His physical suffering.
 - B. He had refused "wine mingled with gall" for it was a narcotic.
 - C. He was given vinegar to drink (Psa. 69:21).
- VI. "IT IS FINISHED" (John 19:30).
 - A. Jesus had accomplished the work He came to do (Gen. 3:15).
 - B. By His death and resurrection, He "abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel" (2 Tim. 1:10).
 - C. The Law of Moses was fulfilled and abolished (Matt. 5:17; Col. 2:14).
- VII. "FATHER, INTO YOUR HANDS I COMMIT MY SPIRIT" (Luke 23:46).
 - A. Man is made up of spirit, soul and body" (1 Thess. 5:23).
 - B. Our spirits come from God (Zech. 12:1; Heb. 12:7).
 - C. At death the body returns to dust and the spirit to God (Ecc. 12:7).

Conclusion:

- 1. Jesus died for the church, but we must enter it (Eph. 5:25; Acts 20:28).
- 2. Jesus knocks at the door of our heart, but we must open the door (Rev. 3:20).
- 3. Jesus was crucified, but we must put sin to death in our lives (Gal. 2:20; Col. 3:5).
- 4. Jesus was buried and raised from the dead; but we must die to sin, be buried and raised in baptism to become new creatures and walk in newness of life (Rom. 6:3-5).
- 5. Don't die separated from God; come to Jesus today!
